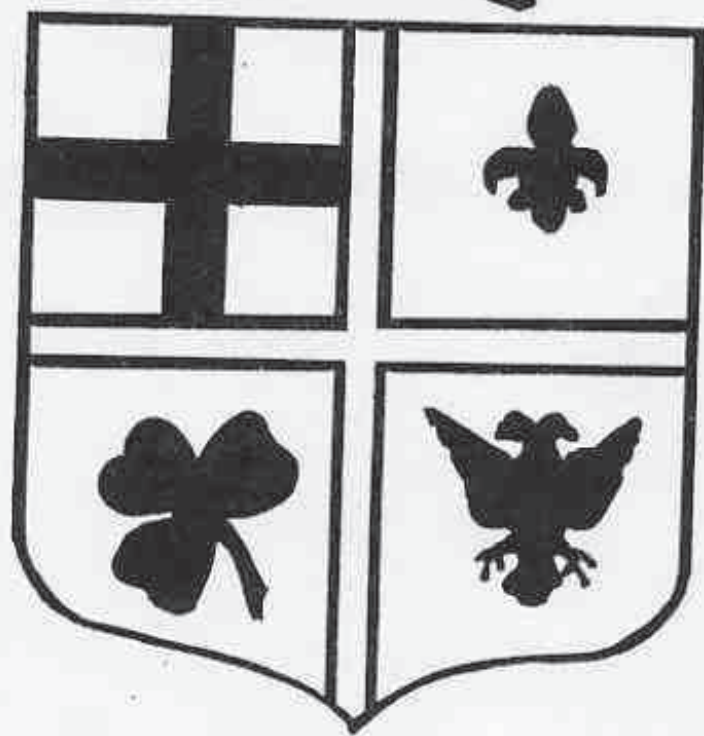

Lutheran Ancestors

The Concordia Historical Institute, Dept. at Archives and History, 801 DeMun, St. Louis, MO 63103, is extremely helpful when trying to track down your Lutheran ancestors in the U.S. They can help you locate what churches were functioning in a particular area, and where the records are located if the church is defunct. They offer membership in their Institute which gives you discount research rates. You'll receive a newsletter and quarterly. Although they have much history on the Lutheran Church in America, their main interest is in the Missouri Synod Church.

DAR Lineage Requests

Information on lineages and patriots may be obtained from Registrar General's Office, NSDAR, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006. To request a copy of the application paper, enclose a check made payable to Treasure General in the amount of \$3.00, patriot name, lineage number, and name of the ancestor. If more than one application is on file, the latest copy will be provided.

A word of caution: The DAR advises that the lineages appearing in the early DAR lineage books may contain errors and mistakes. In the early years of recording lineages, the DAR did not require actual proof of lineage or supporting documentation. Thus mistakes were recorded. Please use caution and only use these lineages as reference. (Rock County Gen. Soc., May/June 1993)

Pennsylvania

Pennsylvania county maps, which include cemetery locations, can be obtained from Pennsylvania DOT, Public Sales Section, P.O. Box 134, Middletown, PA 17057. Specify the county you want and ask for General Highway Service Map #10. (Rock County Gen. Soc., May/June 1993)

Canadian Census Available,

The 1901 Canadian Census returns were opened to the public early in 1993. Microfilms of the census records may be borrowed for your use by any institution possessing a microfilm reader and participating in interlibrary loan arrangement. Requests for loans must be submitted by the borrowing institution, on authorized forms, clearly specifying the sources and reels required.

Also of interest to Canadian researchers are the homestead records for Alberta. The records are in the custody of: Provincial Archives, 12845 - 109 Ave., Edmonton, Alberta, T5N 0M6 Canada. (ILLS Teaser, Vol. 9 #2)

1879 KANKAKEE COUNTY DEATHS

Taken from The Kankakee Gazette.

(Apr 17) In this city, April 12, of typhoid, Alice Lucinda, only daughter of Henry and Elflna Schelling, aged 10 years.

(Apr 17) In Momence, March 20, of dropsy, Mrs. Margaret Nichols, aged 82 years and 6 months.

(Apr 24) In Wesley, Will county, of inflammation of the lungs, Dora Wilson, aged 17 months.

(Apr 24) In this city, April 9, of measles, Artie Hay, aged 2 years and 4 months.

(Apr 24) Jacob Minnick, residing In the northwest corner of Pilot, came to town last Saturday to get a coffin for his two-year old daughter Edith, who was drowned the afternoon before by falling into a well. Mr. Minnick's two little girls, aged four and two years, were playing in the yard and the older child removed the cover to the well, which was only four feet deep and contained two and a half feet of water. Noting the act Mr. Minnick called the child to him for correction. In a moment he sent her back to look for her sister. He soon heard the child calling for the missing one, and suspecting something wrong the father approached the well and upon looking into it found the little one floating on the water. He used the best means with which he was acquainted to restore life into her little frame but his efforts were futile. No doubt she might have been revived had there been any person at hand who was familiar with the methods of treating drowned persons.

(May 1) In Yellowhead, April 6, Mrs. Polly Bartlett, aged 75 years, 3 months and 13 days.

(May 1) Willile Hatch, aged 20, son of F. W. Hatch, of Earl Park, was instantly killed at that place last Saturday morning about six o'clock, by the local freight which arrives here at noon. He attempted to cross the track in front of the train which was coming down the grade at a rapid rate, in order to reach his team, but miscalculated the distance and was struck by the engine. The entire train passed over him, mangling him in a fearful manner. His father was in Cabery at the time and was telegraphed to return home immediately.

(May 8) In Yellowhead, March 27, of apoplexy, Frederick Klee, aged 67 years.

(May 15) In Rockville, May 11, of consumption, Harriet E., Daughter of Samuel Taylor, aged 23 years.

(May 15) In this city, March 31, of consumption, Mary Bell Skinner, aged 21 years.

(May 15) In Manteno, April 12, of croup, Marie Lucie Trudeau, aged 4 years.

(May 15) In Limestone, April 9, of typhoid pneumonia, Mrs. Sophia Tebria, aged 49 years.

(May 15) In Kankakee, April 27, of inflammation of the stomach, Mrs. Ann M. Nelson, aged 28 years.

(May 22) In Manteno, May 6th, Jessie Kinney, aged 17 years.

(May 22) In Momence, May 6th, of typhoid, James McKeever, aged 33 years, 6 months.

(May 22) In Ganer, May 5, of dropsy, Barnard Mullaney, aged 54 years.

(May 22) In Momence, May 9th, of teething, Eddie Murray, aged 11 months.

(May 22) At Battle Creek, Michigan, on May 13th inst., Emma Coil Farley, beloved wife of Esam Farley, aged 27 years. Mrs. Farley has lived in this community since childhood, and was beloved by everyone who knew her. Some three years since she became the wife of the husband who survives her and mourns her loss. Through an extended sickness of many months, and of much suffering, she was always patient and uncomplaining and had an unshaken trust in the world's Redeemer and died in the full triumphs of the Christian faith. Sorrowfully we laid her away to rest (beside kindred already gone) in the private cemetery on the farm of D. T. Vanmeter, who, with his wife, mourns the loss of one who was to their childless home its light and joy for many a year.

(May 29) In this city, April 24, Mr. Zepher Carrignan, aged 66 years and four months.

(May 29) In this city, May 5, of pneumonia, Frederick Haehnle, aged 8 months.

(Jun 5) Quite a number of people in this vicinity went to Salina yesterday to pay the last respects to Mother Obrecht. Mrs. Obrecht was 75 years old. Her disease was dropsy, from which she suffered a number of years. There were 65 teams followed her to the Zion church, where an able sermon was preached by Rev. W. Gross. She leaves a host of friends who mourn her departure, but not as such who have no hope.

(Jun 12) In St. George, April 25, of inflammation of the brain, Wm. Bissonette, aged six years, 8 months.

MARRIAGE OF HERMAN KRAMER & KATIE KNECHT

Taken from The Kankakee Gazette, April 10, 1879.

A pleasant and stylish wedding was celebrated at the residence of our old townsman, John Knecht, last Tuesday afternoon, at which time his daughter Katie A. was married to Herman Kramer, who for a couple of years past has been the popular cutter in Mr. Knecht's establishment. The ceremony was performed by Rev. George Vetter, of the German Methodist church, in the presence of about 75 invited guests, several of whom were from Chicago and elsewhere. The bride, a modest and attractive little woman, was attired in a dress of wine silk. The presents were unusually numerous and elegant.

Mr. Knecht has been in the clothing business in this place for the past twenty years, and stands high in the esteem and confidence of every man, woman and child in the community. This is the first time he has been called up to assume the relation of father-in-law, and, as usual upon such occasions, he was made the recipient of hearty congratulations. The young man upon whom he has bestowed a cherished daughter is unexceptional in every respect and fully deserving of the trust placed in his keeping.

WALDRON - 1879

Taken from The Kankakee Gazette, April 18, 1879.

Farmers are trying to do something in the way of plowing and sowing. Oats, winter wheat and rye look splendid.

Mr. Smith preaches alternately morning and evening. Next Sabbath, the 20th, will be in the morning.

Several of our young men have taken Horace Greeley's advice and gone West. Among the number are Mark Dent, Jim Corless, F. A. Stansberry, Ned Haskins and Frank Roberts. Many good luck attend them.

Died on April 9th, of consumption, Mrs. Clara Wadley, wife of Case Wadley, Jr., aged 25 years.

Died on the 11th, Mrs. Knight, of consumption. Her death has been expected for a long time. She was a widow, and leaves one boy about sixteen, we understand.

The schools about here have all engaged teachers, and some have commenced. District No. 7 will be taught by Miss Belsford, from Onarga; No. 9, by A. J. Byrns; the Mt. Langum, by Dale Warner, and the Danforth by Addle Beardsley. Miss Lou Perry teaches the Palissard school.

OBITUARY OF THOMAS REED.

Taken from The Kankakee Gazette, April 24, 1879.

The death of Thomas Reed, in this city, last Saturday, was the passing away of a mortal whose sands of life were run and who, in the fullness of his years and the ripeness of his moral character, was as a sheaf ready for the store house - a saint to whom the Master's call was a welcome visitation. He was a genial man in his intercourse with his fellows, intelligent and interesting in his conversation, and generous in his dealings. The highest eulogy we can pronounce upon such a character is to say that in his death the community loses an honorable citizen, the church a faithful supporter, his family a noble friend and protector, and society a living example. The funeral services were held at the Presbyterian church Monday afternoon, after which the remains were taken to Manteno, his former home, where another service was held. From Mr. Oggel's sermon in this city the following facts are gleaned.

Thomas Reed was born in Massachusetts on the 7th day of June, 1797, coming to Illinois 25 years ago, locating near Manteno, on a farm. In 1871 he came to Kankakee and bought a pleasant home in which he resided to the time of his death. Fifty-two years ago he married his present wife, who, with three children, ace left to mourn his departure.

DEATH OF MRS. KENAGA

Taken from The Kankakee Gazette, May 22, 1879.

The sudden announcement of the death of Mrs. William F. Kenega, wife of our county clerk, last Friday morning, shocked the community and created a feeling of sympathy more universal than has been felt here for a number of years. Even the members of her own family were unprepared for the blow though they had been watching beside her sick bed during the greater portion of her three weeks' illness. On the morning of the sad occurrence, and up to within a few moments of her death, the invalid was cheerful and chatty. Her passing away was as sudden as the descent of the tropical night after the last rays of the sun have glided the hilltops. The immediate cause of this unlooked for event was latent heart disease developed by her illness.....

She had a personal acquaintance with almost every one in the community, dating back to 1863, when she was engaged in teaching in the public school, and continuing almost up to the time of her illness when her pleasant face was becoming a familiar feature in her husband's office. A woman of fine mental facilities, capable of comprehending the intricacies of business details, she was at the same time possessed of a warm heart and strong domestic tastes.

Annie Sinclair was born in York, Livingston county, N.Y., Dec. 27, 1836. She received a portion of her education at the Clover street Seminary, Rochester, where she was a class-mate of Mrs. H. C. Clark, nee Cobb, of this

city. In 1863 she came to Kankakee and taught in the district school of the "flat" until the union district was organized.... In 1866 William Kenega returned from "the front" with a wound which necessitated the amputation of his leg, but his affianced young wife clung to him only the closer, and in the fall of that year they were married at her old home. Their married life is said to have been a singularly harmonious one - such a union as can only be possible between two thoroughly congenial natures....

ORPHAN CHILDREN

Taken from The Kankakee Gazette, April 24, 1879.

A company of orphan children, numbering 31, from the New York Juvenile asylum, were brought here last Wednesday morning for the purpose of finding them good homes. There were only four girls in the whole company. The ages of the children ranged from seven to seventeen years. We are informed that nineteen were taken by residents of this city and county, Bro. Keady, of the Times, being one of the number who were willing to risk bringing up another youngster in the way he should go, etc. The children were all bright-looking kids and seemed pleased at the prospect of assuming the identity as somebody's child. That they had been well instructed as to their future rights and advantages was evinced by the action of two of the boys who were turned over to farmers. Of one it is related that on the way home the farmer hauled up at a saloon and invited the youngster to go in and drink a glass of beer with him. The precocious orphan declined and getting down from the wagon made a bee line for the hotel. He said he "wouldn't live with a man like that." The other boy was taken home and routed out the next morning at four o'clock to help "do the chores." This struck him as an unfavorable beginning, and forthwith he set out for town and arrived here in time to be forwarded to Champaign where the remainder of the orphans had gone the night previous.

Six of the nineteen orphan children who were let out to various parties in this city and vicinity, were returned after two weeks' trial to Mr. Wright, the agent, who came here to receive them.

Last month an even score of marriage licenses were issued from the County Clerk's office. The average age of the prospective grooms was 24 years; of the intended brides, 22. The oldest gentlemen was 30; the oldest lady, 37. The youngest gentlemen was 19; the youngest lady, 16.

Nathaniel Drayer, of Yellowhead, was in town last Monday to take his wife back home. Mrs. D. has been here since last January, dangerously ill, and it is a cause of congratulation that she has so far improved that she is able to return to her home.

Chas. Hyer, who has had charge of the shoe department in the deaf and dumb institution at Olathe, Kansas, for over a year past, has returned to Kankakee in consequence of the illness of his brother who is no longer able to attend to the business of the store.

Dr. Hayes, superintendent of the insane asylum at Ossawatamie, Kansas, and Thos. Taylor, of Hutchinson, a member of the State Board of Charities, were in town over Sunday visiting the latter's uncle, Dr. J. S. Taylor. They are delegates to the national convention of boards of state charities now in session in Chicago.

Harris Durham got back from Honduras last week, sick and worn down to a shadow. He was taken with the Panama fever immediately upon landing in Honduras and undoubtedly saved his life by returning when he did. His report of the country and his treatment is anything but rose-colored. He thinks the other boys will be home soon.

H. W. Osborn, day operator at this place for the Illinois Central, has resigned his position and will for a time devote himself to short-hand reporting in the courts. Mr. Osborn has won the esteem of the people of Kankakee by his gentlemanly bearing and correct habits. The young society of the place will lose a respected member in his departure. A CEMETERY ASSOCIATION

Taken from The Kankakee Gazette, June 5, 1879,

The preliminary steps toward the formation of a cemetery association were taken Tuesday evening at the city hall. About thirty-five citizens, principally lot-owners, were present, and a spirit of earnest determination to do something toward putting our cemetery in a respectable and even handsome condition, was apparent.

The meeting was organized by the appointment of Dr. Taylor as chairman and H. C. Todd as secretary.

The object of the meeting was stated by the Doctor, and upon the suggestion of S. R. Moore a motion was made by R. J. Hanna that the chair appoint seven gentlemen as incorporators of an association.

The chair appointed the following: S. R. Moore, Geo. V. Huling, Emory Cobb, Wesley Bonfield, W. G. Swannell, Hiram Bailey and R. J. Hanna.

Upon motion of Col. Clarke the above committee were requested to confer with Mr. McGrew relative to the terms upon which the unsold lots in the cemetery can be obtained. This committee subsequently appointed a subcommittee, of which Dr. Taylor is chairman, who are authorized to obtain from Mr. McGrew a definite proposition as to the price and the amount of land which he will transfer to the association.

An adjournment was made to next week Saturday evening, when articles of incorporation will have arrived from Springfield and will be presented to the meeting. Officers of the association will also be elected at that meeting.

Grove, and Hickory Creek where it forked, both trails leading to Chicago, one by the way of Cooper's Grove and Blue Island, intersecting Hubbard's trail, and the other by the way of Joliet. Subsequently travel established several other roads to Chicago. At the June term of the county commissioners' court, in 1831, the county was divided into three precincts, of which the south was designated "sugar Creek; Precinct," the middle "Iroquois Precinct" and the north "Kankakee Precinct." The polling place of Kankakee Precinct was at the residence of William Baker, near the Kankakee river, now the site of the town of Aroma.

The records of Iroquois county were destroyed by fire in February, 1863, hence but little is known of the early county government. According to tradition, no person living in the territory detached from Iroquois county ever was elected to county offices. Robert Hill, living at the upper crossing, one mile east of Momence, Allen Bakestraw, living on the farm owned by James Byrns at the time of his death, Alvah Webster, and George W. Byrns, living on S. 25, T. 31, R. 11, East, in the town of Limestone, each served as Justices of the Peace.

ATTEMPT AND FAILURE TO ORGANIZE NEW COUNTY

In 1801, the residents of the territory originally comprising Kankakee county, desirous of being set apart from Will and Iroquois counties, petitioned the legislature for an act permitting the formation of what was to be known as Kankakee county. The legislature passed the act as petitioned, but required that a majority of the votes cast in both Will and Iroquois counties should be in favor of the formation of the new county. Accordingly, at a special election held for that purpose on the first day of April, 1851, Will county cast 1,267 votes for, and 474 against the new measure while Iroquois county cast 192 votes for, and 554 against. Iroquois county giving a majority of 362 votes against organization, the proposition failed. The failure of the measure, however, was by no means regarded as final, as lands along and near the river were being taken and settled quite rapidly. Every settler was enthusiastic over the formation of a new county. Accordingly, in 1852; a second petition was circulated, signed, and presented to

the legislature. As in former proceedings, some of the good brethren of Iroquois county were opposed to the organization of the new county, and met the legislators with various groundless allegations. They claimed, among other things, that the law had not been strictly complied with in describing the territory proposed to be taken for a new county, that the required notices had not been given, and raised many other technical objections.

KANKAKEE COUNTY ORGANIZED

Notwithstanding this opposition, the legislature, on February 11, 1853, passed an act in accordance with the petition, authorizing the formation of anew county, to be called the county of Kankakee, and giving boundaries the same as at present, with the exception of those of the towns of Essex and Norton. It was required, however, that a majority of votes cast in both Will and Iroquois counties should be in favor of organization, and a special election was authorized to be held in the several towns and precincts of said counties, on the first Tuesday of the following April. The County clerk of Iroquois county was required to make returns of the votes cast in Iroquois county to William Parrish, now living in Momence, and James Lamb, James M. Perry and William Durham, of Will county, were appointed special commissioners to receive the vote of their county. The result of the election as certified to by the Secretary of State, for and against organization, was 7,111 votes for, and 703 against in Will county, and 290 for, and 367 against, in Iroquois county.

In making the canvass of votes in Iroquois county, the county clerk associated with him John Chamberlain, county judge, and by virtue thereof, justice of the peace, and George W. Byrns, a justice of the peace of Limestone. The county clerk and Judge Chamberlain assumed authority to throw out the vote of the Limestone Precinct, alleging irregularities in the certificate of the judges or clerks, and presenting the same to the Secretary of State. Thus, on the face of the returns, Iroquois county voted against organizing a new county. A dissenting voice arose, however, in George W. Byrns, who, as a member of the canvassing board, refused to sign the certificate to the Secretary of State, alleging that the vote of

Iroquois county was in favor of organization. Thereupon W. W. Parrish, Dr. Lynd, A. S. Vail, James Byrne, Judge Orson Beebe and others went to Middleport, and with the county clerk examined the poll books and returns from the several precincts of Iroquois county. Becoming fully satisfied that the allegations, as set forth in the following affidavits of Messrs. Byrne and Briant, were correct, took immediate steps to have the returns revised to include the vote cast in Limestone precinct. Uri Osgood, of Joliet, was employed as counsel on behalf of the new county. The affidavits of Mr. Byrne and Mr. Briant will more fully explain the questions under consideration.

George W. Byrne of said Kankakee county being duly sworn according to law deposeth and saith that he resides in that part of said Kankakee county which was formerly included in the county of Iroquois; that at the time of the election on the 5th day of April, A. D., 1853, in the counties of Will and Iroquois to determine whether or not the county of Kankakee should be organized in pursuance of an act of the legislature of the State of Illinois entitled an act to establish the county of Kankakee and for other purposes therein named, approved and in force February 11th, A. D., 1863, he, this affiant, was an acting justice of the peace and that he still is an acting justice of the peace; that he was elected and qualified as said justice of the peace in and for the county of Iroquois in Limestone precinct; that as such justice of the peace he was called upon by the clerk of the county court of Iroquois county and required to be associated with said clerk and with John Chamberlin county judge of said Iroquois county, acting as a justice of the peace to open the poll books and canvass the votes of the election held on said fifth day of April, A. D. 1853, (on, the first Monday of April, 1853,) under and in pursuance of said act above mentioned, to determine whether said county of Kankakee should be organized in pursuance of said act; that when said poll books were opened and the votes canvassed, which was on or about the ninth or tenth day of April, A. D. 1853, it speared Prom all the votes given in the several precincts of said Iroquois county that there was a majority of one hundred and forty votes as nearly as this affiant can now recollect in said Iroquois county for the organization of said

Kankakee county; that in the making up the poll books and the returns thereto attached there were same irregularities and some of them somewhat imperfect, but that the greatest irregularities existed in those poll books where the precincts had voted against the organization of said new county and that by inspecting such poll books in which the greatest irregularities appeared the majority would have been larger than the aforesaid number of one hundred and forty for the organization of said county of Kankakee; that said clerk of Iroquois county and said John Chamberlin acting as justice of the peace refused to allow the votes of Limestone precinct to be counted on account that in one place on the returns according to affiant recollection the word judge or judges was used instead of clerk or clerks which did not affect the regularity of the election in said precinct in any manner; that the majority of the votes at said election was clearly in favor of the organization of said county of Kankakee.

It was alleged by some that the vote cast the year previous in the Limestone precinct was but 92, whereas it was 360. Hence a large number of the votes cast must have been illegal

votes, presumably those of laborers working on the Illinois Central Railroad then in course of construction. Judge Chamberlain and William Pierce, the latter associate justice of Iroquois county, secured injunctions restraining Amos O. Whiteman, county clerk, from correcting the returns and including the returns of Limestone township, and commissioners William Parrish and James Lamb from receiving the returns as corrected. Uri Osgood on the part of the new county and interested parties on account of Iroquois county, presented the question of the legality of the election to the attorney general and Governor Matteson, who decided that the vote of Iroquois was for organization. At the next term of the circuit court in Iroquois county, the injunction was dismissed at the request of the petitioners.

It having been decided that the majority of votes in Will and Iroquois counties were in favor of organizing a new county, steps were taken towards accomplishing that end, and, in accordance with the act of legislature, the second Monday of May, 1853, was set aside for the election of county officers, and to consider the subject of township organization. The election favored township organization and placed in office the following men: Philip Worcester, county judge; Henry S. Bloom and Orson Beebe, associate justices; George M. Stowell, county clerk; George W. Byrns, sheriff; Paul Hathaway, county treasurer; Jacob Gutterson, circuit clerk.

The presumption that Mr. Hathaway never qualified nor acted as county treasurer is substantiated by absence of all information concerning him in the county records. The several officers elected were duly commissioned May 19, 1853, by Joel A. Matteson, Governor, and Alexander Sterne, Secretary of State. By authority vested in the county court as provided in Section 6, of the act, the county court convened in first session in the village of Momence, "June Term A. D., 1853."

Present.

Philip Worcester, presiding judge; Henry S. Bloom and Orson Beebe, associate justices; George M. Stowell, county clerk; George W. Byrns, sheriff.

The court proceeded to lay out the county into six political townships as follows:

Yellowhead.—Fractional township 32 N. E. 15 E. and all of township 32 N. R. 14 E. It will be

noted that Yellowhead is the only township in the county whose boundaries remain as originally made.

Momence.—Consisted of what is now the towns of Summer, Ganeer, Momence, Pembroke, and six sections off east side of what is now St. Anne, T. 30, 12 W.

Aroma.—Consisted of its present boundaries, what is now the boundaries of St. Anne, (except the six sections noted as belonging to Momence) and that portion of the present town of Otto lying south and east of Sec. 20, T. 30 N., R. 13, N.

Bourbonnais.—Consisted of all that portion of the present town of Kankakee lying north of the Kankakee river, and the town of Bourbonnais of the north tier of sections in T. 31, N., R. 11 E., lying east of the Kankakee river.

Rockville.—Consisted of all the present towns of Rockville and Manteno, and the north tier of sections in T. 31 N., R. 11 E., lying east of the Kankakee river.

Limes one.—Consisted of the remainder of the present towns of Limestone, Salina, Pilot, the larger portion of Otto, and that part of Kankakee lying south and west, of the Kankakee river.

By order of the county court an election was held Tuesday June 21, 1853, for the purpose of locating the county seat and electing town officers. The court ordered that the election be held in Yellowhead, at the dwelling house of Russell Seeger, and appointed Russell Seeger, Paul Hathaway and Abiatha Brittan, judges.

Momence.—At the village school house, William A. Chatfield, R. K. Crandall and James M. Perry, judges.

Aroma.—At the public house of Augustus M. Wylie, James Byrns, Alvah Webster and Nathaniel Mellen, judges.

Bourbonnais.—At the public house of Joseph Legris, William Durham, Meador Martin and Jonathan Uran, judges.

Rockville.—At the dwelling house of Henry S. Bloom, George Gay and Greer McElvain, judges.

Limestone.—At the stone school house, Joel B. Hawkins, Alanson Hawkins and James Lamb, judges.

Appointment of Drainage Commissioners. William C. Richards was appointed drainage commissioner.

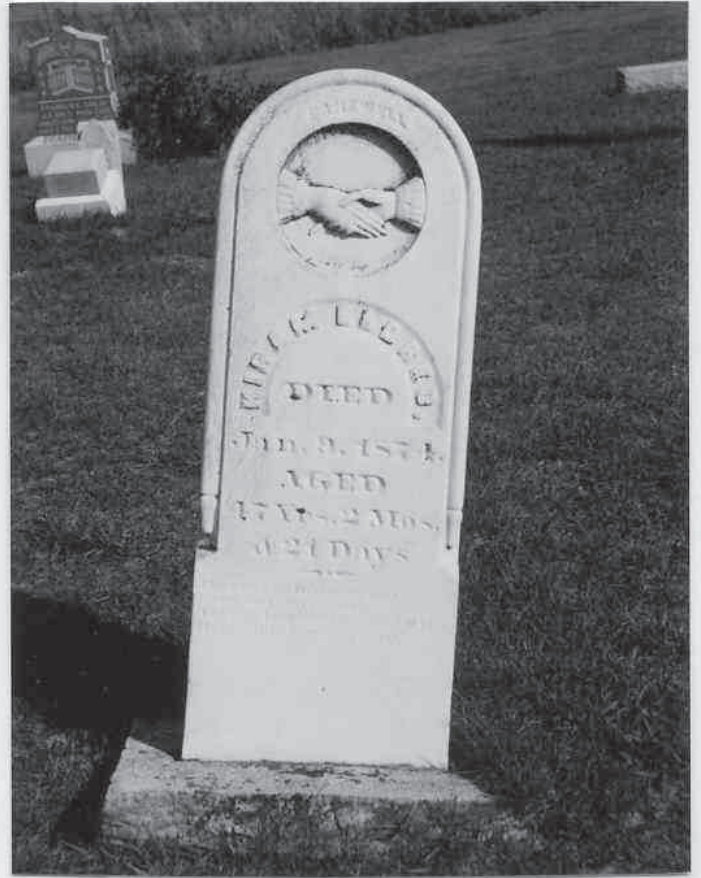
