Newberry Library Now Has Search Services

The Newberry Library in Chicago now has a Friends of Genealogy group to assist the library in various tasks. One of these is staffing the Quick Search services offered to genealogists who are unable to use the Newberry's resources in person. The first search option includes census index, census (where exact citation is know), Chicago city directory, and Chicago death/obit searches.

The second option is a search of Cook County birth and death indexes (1871-1916), Chicago phone directories, and the ordinance town land survey of Ireland maps. Each search requires a completed request form and \$7.00 fee. 1880 KANKAKEE COUNTY DEATHS

Taken from the Kankakee Gazette (publication date in parentheses).

(31 Mar 1881) In Buckingham, March 25, of pneumonia, Jennie Mabel, youngest child of Rev. W. H. and Hannah C. Van Doren, of Buckingham.

(31 Mar 1881) In Manteno, Jan. 20, of neuralgia of the heart, H. N. Dickenson, aged 70 years, 4 months and 9 days.

(31 Mar 1881) At the hospital, March 10?, of spinal disease, Charles Eschert, aged 39 years.

(31 Mar 1881) In Salina, March 23, of whooping cough, Cole, son of John F. And Loesa S.Henkle, aged 8 weeks.

(31 Mar 1881) On Sunday last, in Bradford, III., Edgar Alva, youngest son of Frank and Gertie Porter, aged 1 year and 3 months. "Of such is the kingdom of Heaven."

(31 Mar 1881) The funeral of Mrs. F. H. Dickinson (whose death was announced last week) at the Baptist church, last week Wednesday, was largely attended. Mrs. Dickenson's age was 43 years. For several years she had been engaged in the millinery trade here, and was an industrious and ambitious woman. She had just completed a new house, and the ceaseless toil she took upon herself to fulfill her plans for the future comfort and prosperity of her children no doubt aggravated the sickness which brought her to her death. She leaves four children. Her oldest son is a graduate of Amherst college, and her oldest daughter would have graduated from Hollyoke in another year had she not returned to care for her mother.

(14 Apr 1881) In Kankakee, April 2, of congestion of the lungs, Joseph Shedrach Stevenson, aged seven months.

(14 Apr 1881) In Sumner, April 2, at the residence of his father-in-law, Henry Haslett, James Buintain, aged 29 years.

(21 April 1881) In Otto, April 16, John K. Hammond, aged 69 years, 11 months, 17 days.

Mr. Hammond was born in Milton, Pa., April 29, 1811. He removed to Illinois in 1855, where he has since resided. He was one of our oldest as he was one of the most esteemed citzens of the county. A consistent member of the Methodist Episcopal church for twenty years, he united the character of the Christian with those other qualities which won and retained the respect of the community in which he lived; and while he attached to himself a large circle of friends, he had the abiding love of a large family of children (eleven), all of whom survive him and were in attendance upon the funeral, together with five son-in-law and four daughters-in-law. The funeral was attended by 200 persons.

COUNTY COURT - 1881

Taken from the Kankakee Gazette, April 7, 1881.

Claims Allowed

Mr. Cochran represents the firm of H. H. Hill & Co. who recently published an exhaustive history of Iroquois County.

At half-past eight Sunday morning the two story frame buildings on Court street, east of the Huling building, were destroyed by fire, which caught in the back rom of Fellows' meat market near the stove. None of Fellows' stock was saved, neither were any of contents of L. Petrow's cabinet shop overhead. Everything belonging to Joseph Whitham's tin shop in the adjoining building was taken out in good shape. The building in which the fire originated was owned by F. Crawford, and the other building by the estate of Henry Stege. There was no insurance on either, but the loss is small as the structures were old. His total loss over and above the insurance is \$150, besides the greater loss of being thrown out of a location with no immediate prospect of getting another desirable one. Petro's loss is \$---, on which there was no insurance. It is said that Mr. Crawford will erect a two-story brick building on the site of the burnt property.

Kankakee county furnishing Companies H and K, two-thirds of Company B, and five members of Company D; in all two hnudred and eighteen men.

The companies from this county first went into camp at the fair grounds at Kankakee in August, 1862, and subsequently in Camp Hancock, afterwards Camp Douglas, Chicago; where it was mustered into service October 1, 1862, Col. George B. Hoge, commanding.

From the date of muster to November 6, following, it was employed in guarding confederate prisoners confined in Camp Douglas.

November 6, 1862, the regiment was ordered to Memphis, Tennessee, to report to General Sherman and on its arrival went into camp until joining the "Tallahatchee Expedition," commanded by General Sherman. On its return it went into camp until December 24, 1862, and then accompanied General Sherman on his his movement against Vicksburg. It was then brigaded as the Second Brigade, Fourth Division, General Morgan L. Smith, commanding.

The regiment participated in the battle of Chickasaw Bayou, and following that the battle of Arkansas Post January 10 and 11, where they lost heavily. Thereafter, Companies C. D, F, I and K, were ordered to Springfield, Illinois, to recruit, having suffered very heavy losses and remained doing guard duty until the fall of 1864, when they rejoined their regiment.

The companies remaining in the field went to Young's Point with the army, its colonel then being appointed provost marshal, for the Fif• teenth Army Corps, under Sherman, and holding that position until the army went to Milliken's Bend.

During its camp life at Young's Point, the One Hundred and Thirteenth went with the brigade chosen and led by General Sherman in person, and after leaving transports made a forced march on foot of twenty-five miles, to the relief of Admiral Porter and six or eight of his gunboats, which were surrounded by the enemy.

The country was of such a nature that the whole force had to proceed over extemporized bridges made of single logs or planks, proceeding in single file, and suffering many hardships and inconveniences. Finally, however, they arrived in time to give the Admiral much needed assistance in defeating the enemy. After relievin^g the fleet the soldiers had no alternative but to "coon it" back to their transports, and reached camp after an absence of ten days. Their next battle was the siege of Vicksburg.

The regiment was put on provost duty at Chickasaw Bayou, an exceedingly unhealthy place, with the result that in a short time almost every officer and man was on the sick list.

The regiment was at Corinth from August to January 25, 1864.

While at Memphis, in March, 1864, the five companies that had been detailed for guard duty at Springfield, Illinois, rejoined the regiment.

In June, 1864, it accompanied General Sturges on his ill-fated and disastrous expedition to Guntown, Mississippi, against General N. B. Forest. where the regiment suffered a loss of fourteen officers and thirty-five men killed, wounded or captured.

The fighting began at about eleven o'clock A. M. and continued furiously until four in the afternoon, when the enemy having turned the Union left, for fear the whole force would be surrounded, a retreat was ordered, whereupon there followed a scene of wild disorder. Night falling on the panic stricken army, the wagon train became mired in a swamp, blocking the road to such an extent that the artillery could not pass and had to be abandoned. That part of the infantry not cut off or captured was saved by the signal bravery of Grierson's faithful cavalrymen, who held back the triumphant and plundering troops of the Confederate General Forest.

Many of the men were cut off from their disorganized regiments and in the confusion of the retreat, struck out singly, in pairs and squads across country for Memphis, many of them traveling a hundred miles without tasting food.

The remaining command reached Memphis disorganized, half-starved, and foot-sore, all bitterly and justly cursing the heartless and inexcusable stupidity of General Sturges, who, at the first indication of a rout, deserted his command and reached Memphis, safe and sound, a crime which resulted in the death or capture of many a nobler and braver soldier.

General Sturges may have been a good soldier and a true patriot, but many moons will pass before the men whom he led into that death trap will be willing to regard him as such.

After the defeat' the fragment of the regiment did provost duty in Memphis, and October 1.

1864, took part in General Washburn's expedition, later engaging in the disastrous battle at East Port, Mississippi. where two officers and fourteen men were killed. The balance of the term of service was spent in doing picket and provost duty in Memphis, being present in that city when General Forest made his famous raid, riding on horseback into the Gayosa House, his soldiers and himself refreshing themselves at the bar with the best on tap at the expense of the landlord. June 20, 1865, the regiment was mustered out and proceeded to Chicago, Ill., where it received final payment and discharge, June 25, 1865.

ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-SEVENTH ILLINOIS INFANTRY.

The One Hundred and Twenty-Seventh Illinois Infantry was mustered into service at Camp Douglas, Chicago, September 6, 1862, under call of President Lincoln for 500,000 volunteers.

Companies B and G were principally from Cook county, the balance of the regiment coming from Grundy, Kane, Du Page and Kendall counties.

November 9, 1862, they left Camp Douglas and arrived in Memphis the 13th, after joining General Sherman in his pursuit of Generals Price and Van Dorn in the vicinity of Tallahatchie. Still with Sherman they went to Yazoo and Chickasaw Pass in December and January, and later marched to Arkansas Post under McClernand. The regiment performed picket duty at Young's Point and on the peninsula opposite Vicksburg, where they worked on the famous canal while on fatigue duty. In Mayit crossed the Mississippi at Grand Gulf and formed a part of Grant's forces which invested Vicksburg on May 18, 1863. On the 19th and 20th it planted its colors on the glacis of the rebel works with a result of fifteen killed and sixty wounded, and subsequently was on detached duty at Chickasaw Bayou until within a few days of the surrender, when it returned to the trenches and was present at the downfall of the Confederate stronghold, July 4, 1863.

Immediately after, the fifty men fit for duty accompanied General Sherman to Jackson, Mississippi, where they assisted in driving Joe Johnston from the city. Returning from Jackson they camped near Big Black river, fifteen miles east of Vicksburg. The regiment at this time had four hundred in the hospital on Walnut Hills.


September witnessed the departure with Sherman to Chattanooga, a march of about three hundred miles, where, upon arriving in November, they confronted General Bragg's army in the battles of Lookout Mountain and Mission Ridge, November 22 to 25. They later joined the expedition to Knoxville, Tennessee, for the relief of General Burnside, returning to Bridgeport about December 18, 1863.

The regiment was conspicuous in the series of battles around Resaca, Georgia, notably on the evening of May 14, 1864, when the brigade of which it was a part carried the fortifications along the strongly fortified slope of Conasine creek by a desperate assault with the bayonet, at the same time capturing a number of prisoners. Following this came the return assault of General Cleburne's rebel division, whose three desperate charges were each time bloodily repulsed.

The One Hundred and Twenty-seventh was also prominent in the advance on Atlanta; accompanied General Sherman on his "march to the sea," and north to Washington, where, in the Grand Review, it was especially complimented for its discipline and soldierly bearing. It was mustered for discharge at Washington, June 4, 1865, and left for Chicago, where it was finally mustered and discharged June 17, 1865. The actual number of men discharged was two hundred and forty out of the nine hundred which left Camp Douglas in 1862.


