PRESIDENTS REPORT

It's hard to believe another year has gone by but much headway has been made on new publications this year. Three of the four 1880 census books became available, Grand Prairie was reprinted with permission from the Superintendent of Schools, Memorial Gardens Volume 2 was completed and will be available in January 2004, Manteno United Methodist Church Records is currently being indexed and should be available early in 2004. Also, we are nearing completion of the Maternity BVM Catholic Church Baptism and Marriage Records as well as the Index to the Otto Township Centennial Book. Revised St. Rose Cemetery Book with additional records from the 1940's through 1970's. We're also working on the Zion Lutheran Church Records, Bonfield, and have completed the first of three books. The Immaculate Conception Church Records is also nearing completion.

Our copier now has run over 346,000 copies. A used Xerox copier was donated to the society so we now have two copiers. We will probably trade one of these in for a new machine sometime this year. We've also copied the State Hospital Records from the 1880, 1900, 1910, 1920 and 1930 censuses. These will be put in book form with a surname index and should be available for purchase later this year. Volunteers are always needed for our many on-going projects.

Common Law Copyright

According to experts. here is a way to copyright your family history materials. It's called "Common Law Copyright" and it's easy to do. Simply write "Copyright" and then the year in which you began writing your material and your name. It will protect your work until it is printed. When material is at a point that you worry about copyright, simply put a copy of whatever it is into an envelope and take it to the post office. Mail it certified mail to yourself. When it is delivered, file it away with the seal unbroken. That way you have a sealed envelope that is dated by the USPS showing that you had written the material on that date. *Central Illinois News, May/June 2003*

Slashes and Dashes

As you're reading a genealogist report, you see one person's birth listed as 1730/31, while another person's birth is listed 1730-31. What's the difference? Slashes and dashes mean very different things to genealogists. You'll want to be sure to use them properly when you communicate with other genealogists. Here's a quick guide to keeping your slashes and dashes in line.

Dash: A dash gives a time frame in which the event is presumed to have happened. If you know from other evidence that your ancestor "Sally Southwick" was born in 1730 or 1731, but don't know for sure which year is the correct one, write her birth date as 1730-31.

Slash: A slash indicates a double date, a date which may have been written in either of two forms. Between the years 1582 and 1752, two different calendar systems were in use in England and the United States. The old Julian calendar started its year on 25 March. The new Gregorian calendar started its year on 1 January.

This means that double-dating is necessary from 1 January to 24 March each year during this period. (No double dating necessary from 25 March to 31 December, however. During these months, the years would have been the same.) *The Family Tree via Central IL News May/June 2003*

Hints for Searching Printed Indexes

Look for other names that sound the same even though they are spelled differently. Look for nicknames of given names. For Germans and Swedes also look for their middle name since many went by this name.

The two capital letters that are most often mistaken for each other are "L" and "S" in handwriting in the 1800's. The same is true for "T" and "Y" and sometimes "I" and "J". If your surname starts with one of these letters, check the spelling starting with the other letter. Abstractors can make mistakes. *Bureau Co. Gene. Soc. Nov. - Dec. 2003.*

The marriage license of Samuel Wakeling of Topeka, Kansas, and Miss Adell Deebank, of this city, was published in the Chicago papers of Saturday.

Run Over and Badly Hurt

W. F. Gougar, the coal merchant, met with an accident last Friday evening which at his advanced age may result fatally. He was crossing the Illinois Central tracks at Merchant street, after dark. Behind him was a grovery wagon, crossing in the same direction. When the driver was fairly on the tracks he discovered trains coming in both directions, and was obliged to whip his horse to escape from his dangerous position. The horse, frightened by the whip and the approaching cars, started on a run, overtaking and knocking Mr. Gougar down. The old gentleman, conscious but unable to walk, was removed to his home where Dr. Knott attended him and found the left leg broken at the hig, and evidences of internal injury where the wagon-thill is supposed to have struck Mr. Gougar in the side. Judge Blades last week granted a perpetual injunction against the town of Kankakee to restrain the transfer of \$30,000 of C., L. & C. stock to the Kankakee & Seneca company. The point made was that the transfer as voted by the town a year ago last spring was a virtual violation of the constitutional act prohibiting a donation in aid of corporations.

E. Benjamin, of this city, has been informed of the death of his daughter, aged about five years, at Syracuse. where Mrs. B. and her two children have been visiting.

where Dudley Beebe, his father, engaged in farming until his death, which took place March 7, 1853. His wife died September 1, 1840. Asa Beebe was reared upon the home farm of his parents, attending the earlier schools of his day. January 9, 1851, he married Miss Henrietta Mellen. She was a native of Bennington county, Vermont, born February 21, 1831. Her parents, Nathaniel and Achsah (Wheeler) Mellen, came to Kankakee county in 1838 and her father was engaged in farming until March 27, 1866, when he died. Her mother died October 27, 1875. Mr. Asa Beebe prospered and accumulated a snug fortune, and in 1892 removed to Kankakee. Mrs. Asa Beebe died March 13, 1893.

family of seven children born to his parents, all of whom have passed away except our subject and Alma May, wife of Edgar Legg, of Kankakee.

Reared on the old homestead where he was born, Mr. Beebe drew his education from the district schools and the Northern Indiana Normal school at Valparaiso, Ind., and assisted his father in carrying on the farm. He' was engaged in agricultural labors until 1901, when he moved to Kankakee and retired from active life, having accumulated enough of the world's goods to supply his wants and more.

March 16, 1892, Mr. Beebe married Miss Mary A. Lewis, daughter of Sylvenas and Caroline (Griswold) Lewis, a native of Michigan, and reared there until some fifteen years old. They are the parents of two children: Asa L., and Gladys M.

Mr. Beebe still owns the old homestead farm of two hundred and fifteen acres, which is in a high state of cultivation, and which he now rents.

In politics, he affiliates with the republican party, and takes an active interest in all that tends to the up-building of the community, in which he lives. Socially, he is a member of the Royal Arcanum and the Elks. He and his estimable wife are members of the Presbyterian church.

Having been born and reared here, he has a host of appreciative friends. He is a great social favorite, and has a most extensive circle of friends and acquaintances, who esteem him highly for his genuine worth.

BEEBE, THOMAS A .- The family name of

took up government land in Aroma township this gentleman is one which has been long and honorably associated' with the history of Kankakee county, and it is worthily borne by Thomas A. Beebe, who ranks among the bright, progressive and enterprising business men of Kankakee. He was engaged for years in operating a steam laundry at No. 248 Court street, and built up a respectable trade, but sold out in 1904. He is a descendant of one of the pioneer families who have been such important factors in the development of this part of the state and have made Kankakee county what it is today.

Mr. Beebe was born in Kankakee, October 17, 1864, and is the son of William and Mary F. (Legg) Beebe. His grandfather, Dudley Beebe, was a native of New Hampshire, of Mr. Mark M. Beebe was the youngest of a Welsh descent, who removed early in life to Vermont. There he married Miss Dollie Stearns, who was a native of the Green Mountain state. In 1838 they, with their family, came west and located in what is now Aroma township. Here Dudley Beebe was engaged in "farming until his death in 1853. His wife died in 1840. William Beebe, the father of the subject of this memoir, was born in Bennington County, Vermont, .March 25, 1831. He was brought to Kankakee county in 1838, while a child, and was reared and educated here. He grew up on the farm purchased by his father, on section 12, Aroma township, March 8, 1858, he married Miss Mary F. Legg. At the time of his father's death he bought out the interest of the other heirs in the old homestead, on which he made his home for many years, and which he still owns. Mr. William Beebe and his wife were the parents of four children, viz.: Edgar F., who is a farmer residing in Aroma township; Ida, the wife of Avery K. Carmichael, of Kankakee; Eva, the wife of Perry Kibbins, a resident on the old home farm, engaged in agricultural pursuits. Thomas A., the youngest, is the subject of this biography. For a more extended history of Mr. William Beebe see another page of this volume.

> Thomas A. Beebe was reared upon the farm and laid the foundation of his education in the common schools of the township and in the graded schools of Kankakee. Subsequently he was a student at a commercial college in Chicago, from which he profited much.

Attaining manhood he assumed its duties and for ten years labored diligently and persistently on the farm. Believing himself fitted for mercantile life he came to Kankakee and successfully carried on a meat market. He opened, later, as before stated, a steam laundry and operated it for seven years, selling out in November, 1904.

He married June 28, 1905, Ines L. Washington, daughter of W. A. and Louisa Washington.

He is a member of the Elks, of the Royal Arcanum and of the Modern Woodmen, also Howard Lodge, I. O. O. F. He is a very popular man in the community, and has hosts of friends. He is looked upon as one of the public spirited and enterprising citizens and takes an interest in all public improvements and in all matters that work to the advantage of his native county.

BEEBE, WILLIAM.—The youth desiring to embark upon an agricultural life may learn lessons of value and practicability from the long farming career of William Beebe, formerly of Aroma township, but since 1895, a retired citizen of Kankakee. Mr. Beebe's right to retire from the ranks of toilers is based upon an industrious and well directed life, upon the consciousness of having done well whatever tasks confronted him, and upon the widely known fact that he has dealt in all fairness with his fellowmen. At this leisurely stage of his career he has no thought for the provision of tomorrow, for a splendid farm of two hundred and forty-three acres in Aroma township brings him a comfortable income, augmented by the additional re-sources of considerable town property.

Born on a mountainous farm in Bennington county, Vermont. March 25, 1831, Mr. Beebe is descended from an old New England ancestry, and from forefathers long identified with New Hampshire, where his father, Dudley Beebe, was born, and from where he removed as a child with his parents to Bennington county, Vermont. His mother, formerly Dollie Stearns, was born in the Green Mountain state, and had, besides William, three older, and one younger, child. In 1838 the parents far sightedness led them to abandon sterile

Vermont and seek a livelihood upon the

fertile farm lands of Illinois. They settled in Aroma township, which then was in Will county, and here Dudley Beebe prospered, and upon a farm cultivated by his energy, died at the age of seventy-four years.

William was a lad of seven when the family removal to Illinois took place. His memory holds many interesting reminiscences of those early days, when all was wild and unsettled, and when one might go across country for twenty miles without seeing a human habitation. Hospitality necessarily was restricted to few and widely separated occasions, and each household became dependent upon itself in the strictest and most isolated sense. William attended a log school house when the country was shrouded in snow and work on the farm was temporarily lightened, and in this way laid the foundation for an education to which he since has added by the reading of current literature. Through his marriage in 1855, to Mary Legg, he became allied to another pioneer family of Aroma township, established there by his wife's parents, George and Mary Legg, natives of Kentucky. Mr. and Mrs.. Legg settled in Chicago in 1834, where the former became prominent in the then small settlement on the lake shore, and where Mrs. Beebe was born February 17, 1835. In 1837 the family located in what now is Bourbonnais, later moving into a log house upon the present site of Kankakee. Here also Mr. Legg evidenced marked public spiritedness, but his prosperous career was cut short in his prime, in 1844. His wife subsequently made her home with Mrs. Beebe in Aroma township, where her death occurred at the age of seventy-seven years. Mrs. Beebe is the youngest in a family of nine children, of whom she, and her sister, Mrs. Sterling, are the sole survivors.

Mr. and Mrs. Beebe are the parents of four children: Edgar F., Ida M., wife of A. K. Carmichael; Eva D., wife of Perry Kibbins; and Thomas A.

The desire for political or other honors has never invaded the quiet atmosphere of Mr. Beebe's home, although he is not unmindful of his duty as an intelligent and conscientious republican. For many years he has been an honored and helpful member of the Masonic order. His bearing at the age of seventy-four

is that of a man many years his junior, and his face reflects a heart still warm with the zeal and interests of youth. His outlook upon life shows a breadth and thoughtfulness beyond the average, and a certain resoluteness and determination adds another index to the cause of his success.

BEEDLE, ABRAM COLLINS.—Distinguished not only as a pioneer of Kankakee county, but as a man of sterling worth and integrity, Abram C. Beedle is well deserving of special mention in this historical work. He first came to this county in October, 1837, and with the exception of two years spent in the gold fields of California has made his home in this county ever since, having resided upon his present farm for the past sixty-two years. He was born in Fountain county, Ind., February 22, 1828. His grandparents, Joseph and Mary (Meeks) Beedle, were among the very early pioneers of Ohio, making that state their home until 1824, which year marked their advent into Fountain county, Ind., where the remainder of their lives was passed. While living in Ohio they accumulated considerable means, at one time owning about twelve hundred acres of choice land lying along the Miami river. Their family included eleven children, as follows: Samuel, Jacob, Solomon, Joseph, Abiam C., Simeon, Isaac, Aaron, Phoebe, Mari and Eliza.

The fifth child in the grandparents' family was Abram C. the father of our subject, who was born June 15, 1791, in a block house near what is now the city of Dayton, his parents being obliged to take refuge there, as the Indians were exceedingly hostile at that time. He worked upon his father's farm in Miami county, Ohio, until reaching manhood, when he was united in marriage with Nancy A. Riffle, who was born in that county March 7, 1794. Her father, Samuel Riffle, was one of the early pioneers of the state of Ohio, making that state his home until his death. In 1824, in company with his parents and other settlers, Abram C. Beedle settled in Fountain county, Ind., with his family, taking up government land near Newton, as did also the grandfather. After making his home there until October, 1837, the father removed by ox-team to what is now Kankakee county (then known as Will county), taking up a claim in what is now Ganeer

township, but after residing there a few years he went to Joliet and later to Bloomington. Returning to Kankakee county in 1841 he at last settled on the farm which is now the home of his son and namesake, and here his death occurred, March 10, 1846. His noble service in the war of 1812 proved his valor, and all who knew him loved him for his many noble qualities. His widow survived him many years, passing away at the home of one of her sons in Madison county, Iowa, in 1878. The parental family comprised ten children, as follows: Hiram M., deceased; as are also Isaac, John R., Solomon, Mary E., and Elizabeth; Abram C., the subject of this sketch; Sarah, deceased; Rebecca J., a resident of Aberdeen, Wash.; and Louisa, deceased.

The early life of Abram C. Beedle was spent on his father's farn. in Fountain county, Ind., and in October, 1837, *Ewen a boy of nine years, he accompanied his pateats to Kankakee county, Ill., which has practically been his home ever since. In 1852 he varied the monotony or farm life, however, by a trip to the far west, leaving home January 6, in company with several others of like ambitions, for New York City. From here they went by boat to the Isthmus of Panama, and after walking the entire distance • across the Isthmus again boarded a boat, which in due season landed them in. California. Mr. Beedle did not meet with more than average success as a miner and in April, 1854, returned home by way of New York, content again to take up the peaceful pursuits of farm life. April 5, 1857, he was united in. marriage with Miss Elizabeth Lam-port, who was born in Woodstock. Canada West, November 25, 1834. She was a daughter of Benjamin and Mary (Force) Lamport, who in 1847 removed Kankakee county, Ill., where the balance their lives was spent. The family comprised ten children, as follows: Joanna, Elizabeth, Joseph, Marilla, Henry, Thomas, Benjamin, Mary, Ellen and Edward.

After his marriage Mr. Beedle settled on the farm upon which he now resides, and where as has been previously stated his father settled as early as 1843. At one time Mr. Beedle owned three hundred and sixty acres in this county, which was devoted almost exclusively to cattle raising, a branch of agriculture in which he met with more than average success.

Four children blessed the union of Mr. and Mrs. Beedle, as follows: Alma J., born January 18, 1858; Mary E., who was born September 16, 1859; Effa, who was born April 26, 1863, and died November 24, of the same year; and Annie B., who was born July 17, 1868. The wife and mother passed away September 13, 1896, leaving a void in the home where she had been the guiding star for so long. For several years prior to her death she had been a member of the Baptist church. Mr. Beedle is a man of high moral principles and success has come to him as the result of applying these same principles to the everyday duties of life. Politically he supports the republican party.

BEEDY, HENRY J.-For twenty-seven years J. Beedy has been highway commissioner of Manteno township, and his praiseworthy efforts during all this time to secure the best possible country thoroughfares rightly entitles him to the appellation of father of hard roads. Students of economic conditions place such stress upon the character of the roads in a given community, as to judge almost conclusively of the degree of advancement of its inhabitants, and their relation to the progressing, striving world around them. The kings of ancient history were progressive or not according as the roads in their respective realms indicated regard for the migrating for the countrymen and more ready transmission of merchandise. The_ doom of the Persia of today is read in the almost impassable nature of her public arteries. Without good roads encouragement to reach out or draw in from the outside is wanting. It is his practical demonstration of appreciation of the importance of making agreeable and easy the coming and going of mankind in Manteno township, that places Mr. Beedy among the township's most far sighted and public spirited officials.

Mr. Beedy is first of all a farmer, a grower and distributor of necessary products. He was born on a farm in New York state in 1840, a son of Daniel and Sarah (Johnson) Beedy, the latter of whom was born in Vermont. Daniel Beedy combined farming with freighting during his active life, and in the early days used to haul various commodities to Boston. In

1845 he moved to Canada and hauled iron orefor rive years, and in the latter part of 1849 moved to Lockport, Will county, Illinois. In 1851 he rented a farm on Rock Creek, and three years later bought the farm of one hundred and sixty acres a mile and a half west of Manteno, where his death occurred in October, 1877, at the age of seventy-eight years. His wife died in February, 1878, at the age of seventy-eight. The education of Henry J. Beedy was acquired in the schools of Canada and Manteno township, and in October, 1865, he was united in marriage to Emily Hatch, who was born in Vermont, a daughter of Charles Hatch, also of the Green Mountain 'state. In early life Mrs. Beedy removed from the east to Wisconsin, later coming to Kankakee county to engage in teaching, which profession she had followed in Wisconsin. She is the mother of five children: Cora J. Lockie, of Blue Island, Chicago; Clarence H., living on the home farm; Mrs. Angie Peters, of Manteno; Verner E., occupying a farm one and a half miles west of Manteno; and Vennis G., engaged in the clothing business in Kankakee.

Henry J. Beedy succeeded to the farm of his father, which now is one hundred and twenty acres in extent. The care of many years is apparent in all its departments, and one is impressed with the neatness; thrift and order in its external and internal arrangements. For the past twenty-five years the genial owner has made a specialty of feeding steers, and also has devoted considerable • attention to high grade horses. His buildings are noticeable for their adaptiveness to his needs, and for their well-kept condition. He has two barns, one of forty by sixty feet, and another, erected in 1891, of thirty-two by sixty feet. In 1892 Mr. Beedy erected a beautiful country home, furnished it throughout in a tasteful manner, and now has one of the pleasantest, as well as most hospitable, homes in his township. He has been an important adjunct to the political stability of the county, and for many years promoted the cause of education as a member of the school board. This office, and that of highway commissioner, has placed him in direct touch with the most pressing needs of the community. Personally he is an agreeable and popular man, kindly in manner and generous in impulse, and fortunately he is appreciated in the township which he has done so much to improve.


BELLINGER, CHARLES H .- Any history of the men whose opinions and efforts interpret Kankakee county to the rest of the state, and add emphasis and importance to the agricultural prestige of the central west, necessarily must include the name of Charles H. Bellinger, whose home, whose character, and whose life work, approach a standard which may well be emulated by those who are to succeed him in the race. Behind him Mr. Bellinger has the established traditions and regard for honesty and thoroughness of an old New York family of Teutonic origin, presumably established in America by the paternal great-grandfather of Charles H., who located on a farm in Herkimer county, New York, where several succeeding bearers of the name were born and conducted farming enterprises. Here The paternal grandfather, Henry Bellinger, was born, and eventually married Elizabeth Campbell, by whom he had seven children: Mary, Peter, James H., Nancy, Helen, Aurelia, and Margaret.


James H. Bellinger was born on the old homestead in Herkimer county, New York, September 29, 1825, and was educated in the district schools. His wife, formerly Caroline Christie, also was a native of Herkimer county, and was born March 29, 1827, a daughter of John and Margaret (Markle) Christie, of Herkimer county. Mr. Bellinger engaged in farming until his death, November 6, 1898, his widow surviving him until the present time. and making her home with her daughter, Margaret E., the wife of Dr. James I. Rasbach, of Ilion, Herkimer county, New York. She is the mother also of Peter F. who lives in Durango, Colo., Charles H., being her oldest son, and the only member of his family in the central west. Mr. Bellinger owes his preliminary education to the district schools of Herkimer county, and upon this slender foundation he has erected a storehouse of general knowledge, gleaned both from association with people, and communion with books. At a later period in his life he studied at the Fairfield academy, at Fairfield, N. Y., for a short time. At Kankakee, Illinois, September 1, 1869, he married Angeline S. Parish, a native of Momence township, and born October 6, 1848, Mrs. Bellinger is a daughter of William W. and Sallie (Woodard) Parish, the former of whom was born in Ontario county, New York, June 14, 1821, and the latter in Bennington county,

Vermont, April 11, 1828. Mr. Parish came to


Kankakee county in 1840, two years after his wife, who bore him one child, afterward Mrs. Bellinger, and who died October 14, 1848. April 10, 1852, he was united in marriage to Catherine Parkhurst, who died January 30, 1889, and who became the mother of four children: Varnum V., William W., Carrie G., and a daughter who died in infancy. Of these children William W. only is living. Mr. Parish has been a farmer all his life, and now, at the age of eighty-four years, enjoys excellent health, and the companionship of many friends.

Soon after his marriage Mr. Bellinger returned to New York and rented his father's farm in Herkimer county, where he engaged in dairying. hop raising, and general farming. In the spring of 1877 he moved to Kankakee county, and settled on the farm he now occupies, and here, in twenty-eight years, he has accomplished gratifying results. At the time of his coming the prairie farm had an old house, • and still more antiquated barn, and now he has one of the finest rural residences. barns. and general improvements in the township. Though never aspiring to official recognition, Mr. Bellinger has taken a keen interest in republican affairs, 'and has aided many worthy men in securing and filling positions of trust and responsibility. His position in the community is strengthened by association with the Masonic fraternity, in which he is a Shriner and Knight Templar, and in the affairs of which I'?, is prominent and influential. He is one of the leading exponents of scientific farming stock-raising in the county, and in his personality and character is singularly fortunate and confidence inspiring. Mr. and Mrs. Bellinger are the parents of two children, both of whom have profited by the advantages which the success of their parents permitted. William H. was born October 2, 1870, and received his preliminary education in the district schools of Kankakee county. Subsequently-he attended and was graduated from Ilion academy, at Dion, N. Y., and soon after began the reading of medicine with Dr. Thomas of St. Anne, Kankakee county. Two years later he entered Rush Medical college, Chicago, and was graduated from that institution in the class of 1895. The year following he engaged in the practice of medicine at Peoria, Illinois,
