A WORD FROM OUR PRESIDENT

As your new president, I would like to take this opportunity of saying that I am proud to be a member of such a dedicated group of willing workers. A group of willing workers who recognize, as I do, the time and efforts of those who went before them to provide us with the genealogical records, the indexes, and repositories which have served to preserve our heritage and to assist us in our seeking of the truth about our ancestors. A group of willing workers, who now in their time, are attempting to contribute within their available resources, to these three essential elements. I speak of the three essential elements because genealogical records of themselves are so varied and voluminous that without ready access in the form of grouping classifications, and filing as we find in our libraries and other repositories, together with the indexes that accompany them, they would be of little value to us.

Although our resources are limited, it is good for each of us to occasionally take a moment to re-access our individual capabilities to see if we have resources which are not being fully employed. Some may live too far away or be too busy to volunteer their time in sorting publications, some may have failing eye sight which prevents their assisting in preparing indexes, and some may have other problems. However, each of us, as we go about our daily chores, can continue to significantly contribute by creating interest and attracting new members, by talking up the sale of the reproduced 1906 History Of Kankakee County, Illinois, book that we sponsored, and by assisting our follow members in their seeking of the truth about their ancestors.

At our last meeting I passed out 3 x 5 cards and asked each of you, who were seeking information about them, to enter the name of your ancestor, area where they lived, dates lived there, and birth and death dates, if known, together with your name, address, and phone number. We hope to compile an alphabetical listing from these cards and to furnish this listing to each member, for them to keep at hand. Then as we individually scan various indexes, in census rolls, rare and current genealogical publications for information we are seeking about our own ancestors we may run across the name of your ancestor and be able to help our follow member by calling or writing, and telling them of our finding. Those who have not done so, should complete the 3 x 5 surname cards and mail or turn them in on or before 30 November 1973.

In conclusion, I would like for each of you to feel that when you are "stumped" or at a dead-end in your genealogical research, that I'm your "trouble-shooter". My phone number is (815) 932-9307. I don't have all the answers, in fact very few, but I am a central point of contact and know quite a few people who do, or who can recommend and refer you to a new area of research effort. So keep up the good work and may the next genealogical document you see, be the one that you have been so diligently seeking.

INTRODUCTION MOMENCE OF THE OLD FRONTIER

Reprinted from Tales of An Old "Border Town and Along the Kankakee by Burt E. BURROUGHS, Copyrighted 1925

Momence is an old town-the oldest, perhaps, in northeastern Illinois bordering on the Illinois-Indiana state-line. She has entered upon the final decade which, on its completion in 1934, will round out one hundred of existance, speaking by and large. For years it was merely a river settlement without a name, a sort of rallying point for the picturesque southern pioneer hunter, the coureur de bois and voyageur, the Hoosier from the Wabash, and the hard-headed Yankee from Vermont, New Hampshire and New York, whom kindly fortune directed by way of quest of "wood, water and grass." This spot where the pioneers foregathered is rich in stirring tales of the border. Momence, in her old frontier days, reflected in a marked degree those elemental traits so characteristic of border life. The term, "elemental traits," as applied to the few families who constituted the population of the old river settlement of the Kankakee ninety years ago and better is relied upon to convey to the reader an idea of the hardihood, self-reliance and independence that possessed them. In that early day there was an absence of repressive measures, no super-imposed law except that unwritten law of the border which held a man's property inviolate. A man who stole another's horse in that day knew that he risked his neck. The penalty was death-sure, swift, certain death-once he fell within the clutches of the one who had suffered the loss. The settlement and later the town, after it had emerged from this primitive chrysalis, was for years a reflex of this expansive, unrestricted spirit of the pioneer. Naturally, it was, at times, an easy-going, wide-open, red-hot, go-as-you-please sort of burg with as varied and nondescript a lot of dwellers, regular and transient, as ever called for whiskey over anybody's bar, or bet their money on a hand of poker or a horse race, or settled their differences man to man with the bare fists.

Momence is the one town on the river that really has a frontier history. Here, in the long ago, where the prairie trails converged to the fords of the Kankakee, ten or a dozen families were attracted, among them the LACYs, the VanKIRKs, the HILLs, the NICHOLS, the GRAHAMS, the HAYHURSTS, the DICKEYS, the DUTCHERS, the BUFFINGTONS, in the main representative pioneer stock from Indiana with antecedents harking back to Kentucky, Tennessee, Virginia and the Carolinas. These families settled mainly in the near vicinity of the "Upper Crossing". Nearer the settlement of Momence, a mile away, a stream of eastern people settled. Asher SARGEAT was the first to settle there in 1834. In 1835 came his brother, Enoch and a man by the name of McKIBBEN; in 1836 came A. S. VAIL, Judge Orson BEEBE, Caleb WELLS and Col. Lyman

WORCESTER: in 1839 came Walter B. HESS, A. B. PARISH and Dr. MAZUZAN: in 1840 came W. W. PARISH, Benjamin LAMPORT and James NICHOLS: in 1841 came Dr. David LYNDS, James M. PERRY, David PERRY AND Phillip WORCESTER, and others. After the lapse of three-quarters of a centry, representatives of most of these early-day families still walk the streets of the old town and are identified with the social and business life of the community.

In 1849, after the bridge had gone out for the second time, "Westport," or "Lorain", as the "Upper Crossing" was variously termed, gave up trying to be a town and gradually added her forces to the struggling backwoods settlement of Momence. So, you see, Momence, as residuary legatee of "Lorain" and her environs, thus falls heir to her traditions, legends and historical lore, and may reasonably lay claim to one hundred years of stirring history.

The Indian was still here when Dr. TODD platted the town. Clad in his blanket, untouched by the civilization about him, he puzzled over the queer actions of the transit man and he who carried the chain and established a multitude of corners by driving stakes here and there. Vaguely he understood that this mysterious process was a mere preliminary to the placing of the white man's tepee. Civilization was knocking at the door of the redman's domain at last.

The trapper and hunter, the voyageur and courour de bois, vigorus hardy, picturesque in his wilderness attire of skins and bright tasseled cap, found a paradise in the upper reaches of the Kankakee, and a game sanctuary in the vast marsh region of nearby Indiana, which thrilled his soul with savage delight. The squatter and the idler reared his abode of logs by the river's side where ever fancy dictated, untroubled by any thoughts of "meets and bound," or prior claims. In that early day the universe was his. Here he existed in luxurious idleness surrounded by that plenty which only the wilderness bestows, and thanked God and his lucky stars (if he gave thanks at all), for a situation so charming and soul-satisfying.

During the forties and the fifties, particularly during the fall season and early winter, the hosts of freighters from the Wabash country going to Chicago and back again, made Momence their rendezvous. Mr. W. W. PARISH recalls that it was no unusual thing to find as many as one hundred to two hundred teams and wagons disposed along the river at night in camps, while the men, for the most part, filled the saloons and public places of the little settlement and drank and played cards or engaged in conversation as the mood suited. These gatherings represented typical pioneer types. There was the man of the woods, the man of the river, the man of the prairie, every man of them a red-blooded individual whom stern necessity and wilderness training had endowed with the quality of looking out for himself anywhere and under any circumstances. Life, for such as these, was a constant hand-to-hand struggle with the elements and hardships an un-

varying item in the daily round of experiences. Such were the diverse elements that constituted, in a large measure, the frontier society of that day, and on their visits to the settlement they mingled and jostled and touched elbows in a neighborly, friendly way-the good, the bad, the shiftless and indifferent in their common meeting place, the saloon or the backwoods grocery, which served quite as well as the saloon if one merely wanted a drink of liquor. The frontier grocery was the forum wherein Democracy thrived in the days when the nation was in the making.

To this rather unpromising composite of frontier types thus thrown together by chance was added in numbers wholly disproportionate to the sum of Momence's population, thieves of high and low degree, counterfeiters, horse thieves and cattle rustlers, who trecked down stream from that impregnable retreat of "Bogus Island," situated in the great "Kankakee Marshes" over the line in Indiana, only fifteen miles away. Eighty years ago, it should be remembered, an organization of desperate men, known as the "Prairie Banditti," operated in the Mississippi Basin. Chiefly, their efforts were devoted to stealing horses and making and They operated from headquarters circulating counterfeit money. located in some naturally secluded and inaccessible spot adjacent to the Mississippi river, safe from prying eyes and easily defended. Nauvoo City, of the Mormons, was a favored refuge for certain of the Prairie Banditti for years. Notorious "'Dave REDDEN" had a "run-in" on the river below Davenport, Iowa, where the thier of murderer, hard pressed by the officers of justice, might rest secure from detection. This place was known by the suggestive title of "Devil's Run." St. Louis was a clearing house for stolen horses and there was hardly a horse their in that day who did not handle spurious coin and pass it at every opportunity.

As their operations grew other natural harbors of security were made use of, notably in the neighborhood of Terre Haute, in the Eeel River country of Indiana, on the Wabash, and "Bogus Island," situated in the marsh country of Indiana some fifteen miles east of the frontier settlement of Momence. "Bogus Island" with its thousands of acres of open lakes swamps scrub oak ridges and timbers formed the most perfect rendezvous of all. Thus it is we find Momence at the very beginning of her career as a backwoods-settlement a neighbor of notorious "Bogus-Island," and on terms of easy familiarity with the island's habitues. In the course of the years certain members of the squatter and trapper elements easy of conscience and wholly bankrupt as to morals, formed a connection with these island outlaws and served as "spotters," "tip-off men" and purveyors of news generally. A few there were who developed to a point where they could "make a sight" as the location of a desirable horse was termed in outlaw parlance, and also lend valuable aid "in raising the sights" if need be. This squatter "secret service" grew in efficiency as the years went on until its ramifications, penetrating to every quarter, enmeshed the surrounding country until it seemed all but hopeless to prevent a theft, and next to impossible to recover property thus stolen.

SOME EARLY HISTORY

"Something About the First Marriage, The First Birth and the First Death Occurring in Chebanse."

From the CHEBANSE HERALD 15 January 1898

"The New York World of Saturday, January 8th, has the following to say concerning the 40th Wedding Anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. S. G. Parker, of which the Herald made mention a short time ago. It will be noticed that they were the first couple married in Chebanse, were the parents of the first child born here, whose death shortly afterward was the first to occur in the village. The account reads as follows:

'The train stopped at a little station in Illinois, and a tall active young man jumped to the platform and looked about at the unpromising surroundings.

"What do you call this?" he demanded of the only native in sight.

"Chebanse" answered the native. "It's a nice place," he added, "when you get to know the people."

"Yes, I suppose so," answered the young man; "only it must be hard to find the people."

Symmes G. Parker, fresh from New Jersey, started out to become acquainted. He found them after awhile, although they were scattered far and wide, and among them was a mighty pretty Sarah Jane Hanna by name, and no relative of the would-be senator.

Miss Hanna was a mighty pretty girl and Parker was a fine young fellow, and everybody said it was love at first sight. All Chebanse was interested, because there never had been a marriage there, and everybody was looking forward to the first.

And sure enough on January 5, 1858, young Parker (he was young then) and Miss Hanna wedded and Chebanse celebrated its first wedding in royal style. Everybody was there, and even at that the little house where the young carpenter had taken his bride was not overcrowded.

Everybody said Parker and his bride had made history for the settlement, and afterward another page was added to that history when Mr. and Mrs. Parker presented Chebanse with its first baby. Then the people made merry indeed, and it was voted that the young Parker would one day become mayor of the future city. But the city never materialized, and the little baby died in infancy, and then it was that Chebanse had its first funeral.

The Parkers moved from Illinois soon after their bereavement, and returned to New Jersey, where the Parker family holds an honorable record. The carpenter prospered, but when the war came he left everything, and went to the front. He was a good soldier, joined the engineer service and was mustered out at the end of the war with honorable mention.

Mrs. Parker and several little Parkers were living then in Jersey City. Since then the family has had its joys and its sorrows. Out of ten children, six died, but those spared proved blessings to their parents.

On Wednesday the Parkers and their children and their grandchildren celebrated the 40th anniversary of that historical wedding, and their home at 207 Baldwin Avenue, Jersey City, was thronged with well-wishers, many of whom came from the far West. There were many telegrams from little Chebanse, where there have been many weddings and many births and many deaths since the Parkers made history there.

Mr. Parker is still as straight and as sturdy as when he was in the Army. His sixty-four years rest lightly upon him, and his wife though grayer than she was forty years ago, is, in his eyes at least, no less beautiful than when he led her to the alter.
