FROM OUR PRESIDENT

As we pursue our genealogical search by writing to distant archives and libraries, ordering rental books and films from distant points, and waiting the untold days until they are at hand, I would like to point out to you how you can very profitably make use of some of your time. A source which seems to be somewhat neglected by our members, but one which should not be overlooked. I am speaking of the exchange quarterlies on file at our own Kankakee Public Library. There is one complete drawer of them, about three lineal feet. They are too numerous to list here, but even if they were listed it would not tell you what genealogical information was contained therein. A most important point to remember is that most of their genealogical listings are being presented to the public for the first time, by members of their society compiling them from original source documents. Therefore such information is not available from prior publications such as rental books, films, or from archives and libraries and these exchange quarterlies should be considered as a prime source to seek genealogical information. If your search is outside the USA and you think that they would be of no help to you, you could order a book for about five dollars that would tell you where to write to get genealogical information in the country in which you are searching. But contained therein are, "WORLD RECORDS" Vol. 3, No. 4 (Winter, 1970) through Vol. 6, No. 1 (1973), which should give you all the information you need and save you five dollars for other more useful purposes. I have found time to go through about one thtrd of these exchange quarterlies and have found three genealogical items on the families which I am working. assure you that I'm going to find time to go through the other two thirds to see how many other gems I may find.

Speaking of buying a book, brings to mind the thought that most of us have at one time or another bought a book which has now served its purpose and is no longer needed. But it still remains in our personal library, primarily on the vague feeling that some day you might want to refer to it and besides it is too good to throw away. Well, why not cash it in? If that day ever comes when you want to refer to it, it will still be available for you to do so. In addition to gaining shelf space, in your private library, you will be doing a good deed by sharing it with others through donating it to the Kankakee Public Library. However, to cash in on it, you should obtain a receipt, from the library, with it's appraised valuation thereon so that you can list it as a deduction on your income tax return.

Have you checked your membership card lately to see if your dues are due? Have you recently asked someone who is not a member to join? Have you recently tried to help another member by giving advice based on your experience? I know these are basic questions, but they are vital to an active and growing organization. So let's each do our part to keep it that way.

CYRUS S. GRIMES AND HARVEY BROMLEY

Cyrus S. GRIMES and Harvey BROMLEY, brothers-in-law, were early Rockville Township, Kankakee County, Illinois, settlers.

My great-aunt Harriet FARMER was born in Herkimer County, New York, in 1824. She married Cyrus GRIMES, son of Willard GRIMES, of Jefferson County, New York, in 1844. They came to Illinois by covered wagon in 1845.

When I was a child, I loved to hear her tell of the trip west, the Indian scares, sickness, accidents, etc. They followed the wagon route to Lake County, Illinois. It took several weeks to reach their destination. They brought only the most needed essentials, bedding, cooking utensils and tools. Because of limited space, many treasured things had to be left behind.

There was always the thought that someday they would return for them; but, of course, this seldom happened.

Food was acquired by killing fresh meat. Berries and herbs were found in the woods. They had a cow for milk, also a small pig given Harriet by her father, and a few chickens. They also had a small baby. It must have been a very tiresome journey.

In 1849 they moved to Rockville Township, purchased a farm on Rock Creek. The surrounding country was very wild. Dense woods line both sides of Rock Creek. The land was rich and by cutting the timber, they had plenty of lumber for their house and barns.

In 1849 their son George was born. He married a Sarah BELL and moved to Arizona, where he was a sheriff for many years. In 1853, Althea was born. She married Jason ROBINSON. Charles was born in 1857. He married Janette MAGRUDER and second May STUDTMAN POWELL. Frank was born in 1859. He married Ida MAGRUDER.

Cyrus and Harriet were very big hearted and opened their home to other children who had no home. My father, John Charles MARR, born 1867 was one of them. He came to Kankakee on the 16th of May, 1879, on an orphan train. Cyrus was in town that day and went to see the children. He picked him out and took him home with him.

Cyrus raised sheep. There were no fences and they roamed on the prairie. With the coming of more settlers raising cattle, the feud began, for where sheep grazed, the cattle would not. It was a bitter feud between the cattlemen and the sheepmen. I

have heard many tales of the gang killing Cyrus' sheep and his dogs. One day his shepherd ran into the house escaping through the back bedroom window into the woods along the Creek.

The old man was never seen again but a few years later a shallow grave was discovered containing a skeleton.

That ended the feud. They put in the hedge fences for dividing lines and the prairies north of Rock Creek woods were no longer free to be grazed at will.

In 1863 my grandmother, Weltha Ann FARMER, came from Gouverneur, New York, to visit her sister, Harriet GRIMES, whom she had never seen, having been born the year after Harriet came to Illinois. She was 18. She had a wonderful visit that summer. She told me of riding their horses to Bourbonnais. They carried their purchases home in bags thrown across the back of the horse or hung on the saddle horn. She also attended Sunday School in Rockville. The teacher was a Mr. STACY. He gave her a book for perfect attendance.

Weltha returned to St. Lawrence County, New York, and finished college at what is now Canton University. She taught two years then she married Harvey BROMLEY in 1867. They had two daughters, Elsie Luella born in 1869 and Edith Melissa born in 1872. Later that year they moved to Galena, Illinois. Harvey worked on the railroad. He didn't like it so in 1873, they moved to Rockville Township. They came by train but it was a long dusty trip but they thought it wonderful considering how her sister had come 30 years before.

They purchased 40 acres of land and rented another farm across the road from Cyrus GRIMES.

There were Indians along Rock Creek and the Kankakee river. One day when Edith was three, she wandered away from home. It was summer and Weltha thought she was with Harvey in the field. When he came for dinner, it was discovered that Edith was missing. They were sick with fear. They looked everywhere. They were about to get a searching party when they saw an Indian coming up the path along the creek on a pony. In his arms was Edith. He had found her trudging along the creek bank. They found out later that he had stopped several places asking who she belonged to. Needless to say, they were overjoyed and treated that Indian well for bringing her home.

Weltha taught school at Deselm, Rockville Township for several years. In 1880 they had a son, Frank Eric. He died in 1882. She did her own housework and sewing by hand and helped her neighbors when they were ill.

Harriet had a great knowledge of herbs which she grew and gathered. She made a lot of their medicine. I have heard them speak of a Dr. C. W. KNOTT who came out from Kankakee on horseback when there was a serious illness.

When John Charles MARR and Edtth BROMLEY were young, there was a United Brethern church in Flickerville. Everyone along the creek went there. It was about a mile through the woods.

For years the people in Rockville went to Kinkaid's Grove for their picnics. The 4th of July and the 15th of August were big days. There were horse races, footraces of many kinds, tugs-of-war, and ball games. Large iron lanterns were hung on the oak trees at night and there was dancing on a board floor.

Across the creek was a swinging foot bridge fastened to an oak tree and a large willow on the other side. The girls would try to cross on it and the boys would shake it and scare them.

Bloom school was on the corner with Bloom cemetery just east of it. Althea Grimes ROBINSON, Elsie Bromley STEVENS, Nelda Marr NUSBAUM and Ada Baker MARR taught there. Also Nelda Marr, Harvey Marr and their children Margaret Nusbaum KLIPP, Wendell, Harlan, Gerald and Genita MARR went there.

In Bloom cemetery are the Grimes, Robinsons, Bromleys, Stevens, Marrs and Nusbaums.

Bloom's Grove has disappeared. It was bulldozed by Joe and son Glen Mann in 1963. Their ancestor David BLOOM owned the land.

In 1902 Harvey and Weltha BROMLEY bought the Charles P. GRIMES farm across from Bloom's Grove. After their deaths, the farm was owned by Charles and Edith Bromley MARR. After their deaths it was owned by Harvey and Ada Baker MARR and Fred and Nelda Marr NUSBAUM.

The MARR family farmed the land and the NUSBAUM family lived there. Then in 1941 the farm was sold to a Dr. Harold BURNS of Chicago.

Note: Anyone who can prove relationship to either Harriet FARMER GRIMES or WELTHA Ann FARMER BROMLEY is eligible to join the Mayflower Descendants society.

INTRODUCTION MOMENCE OF THE OLD FRONTIER

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During the course of the years the settlement at "'Upper Crossing" attracted a dweller now and then until by 1845, it is said, there were as many as ten or a dozen families located there whose numbers were about evenly divided between the north and south banks of the river. During these years "Upper Crossing" was variously known as "Westport," "Hill's Ford," and later, when Dr. David LYNDS was given the postoffice, as "Lorain." There is a wide difference of opinion or memory as to the old settlement. By some it is contended that there was scarcely anything there besides the tavern, while others are equally positive that there were twelve to fifteen houses on the two sides of the river. There were several stores in the early days. Elon CURTIS clerked in one of them, a place kept by a man by the name of GLOVER. Allen RAKESTRAW, widely known as "Old Dime," from his closeness in financial matters, kept a dram shop. There was also a blacksmith shop. The father of Dr. M. D. GREEN was also the gunsmith. Louis BUFFINGTON kept a tailor shop. Joseph VAN KIRK kept a hotel on the north side of the river for a while. The old settlers of Yellowhead maintain that it was the principal trading point from about 1840 to 1848 and, in that event, it must have been quite a hamlet. The place had a bridge, built in 1842 which lasted until 1846. Another was built which went out in the spring of 1849.

In 1834 Asher SARGEANT built the first habitation, a double log cabin at the island ford a mile to the southwest of the "Upper Crossing" and thus unconsciously acquired fame as the original settler of the present day municipality of Momence. He was the first store keeper at this point for, in one-half of the cabin, he established a small grocery whose principal articles of trade were whiskey and tobacco. As Newell BEEBE expressed it, "they were the cheap products of the country." Asher SARGEANT was followed by his brother Enoch, who came in 1835 accompanied by a man by the name of McKIBBEN. These three, then, were the original first settlers at Momence, within the present city limits.

The double log house erected by Asher SARGEANT, as nearly as can be ascertained at this late date, stood somewhere between the old Worcester and Lane hall and the residence of P. J. CLEARY, probably where the alley now is between Range and Pine streets, just north of the river.

As there were neither roads nor streets nor alleys in that day its exact location would now be difficult to determine. There seems to have been a question in the minds of the older settlers as to the year Asher SARGEANT built his cabin on the Kankakee. John SMITH, of Sherburnville, says that he came to this region with his parents in October, 1835, crossing the river at the present site of Momence. They stopped with Asher SARGEANT who was living in the house at that time. He thinks 1834 is the probable date of its erection.

Asher SARGEANT also built a saw-mill nearby. Some think the saw-mill was the first building put up. It is quite certain, however, that the saw-mill was not built until 1837 or 1838. Mr. SMITH says the saw-mill was not there at the time of his arrival. William PARISH says that the SARGEANT house had "puncheon" or hewed floors, which would not have been the case had SARGEANT built the mill first. Mr. PARISH has a lively recollection of attending a dance at the SARGEANT home and of getting splinters in his bare feet from the floor while dancing. The cotillion was halted while William sat down and extracted them. Several deep seated slivers required the services of his lady to successfully extract, whereupon the dance was resumed.

About 1838, Asher SARGEANT erected as a matter of fact, the first mill for grinding corn in this part of the country. This mill was built on the farm now owned by John H. NICHOLS, one and a half miles northeast of Momence, on Trim Creek. The site was about a half mile east of Hubbard's trail, and a mile north of Hill's Tavern and the location of the first postoffice, Lorain. A dam was built across the creek to the mill. This canal is plainly to be seen today. Also some of the timbers of the old dam such as mud-sils are embedded in the bottom of the creek and are in a good state of preservation. The mill was abandoned about the time the mill was erected in Momence in 1843, on account of lack of power. The grinding buhrs were cast aside and laid near the road for years, finally being sold and taken to Lowell, Indiana, where they were used in a mill for years.

The second house to be built in Momence was also a log structure but the name of the builder is lost to us. Matt ANDERSON and Isaac GRAY lived in it, however, while they were employed at the saw-mill.

In 1836 A. S. VAIL and Orson BEEBE, who came to the Beebe Grove settlement near Crete, Illinois, in 1835, moved on to the Kankakee. As they surmounted the hill north of Momence Mr. Vail enraptured by the marvelous panorama of plains and woods through which the river took its leisurely, winding way, exclaimed: "Here is where I stay." There was the ring of prophesy in his words. He lived to see the wilderness of that day give way to beautiful homes and growing crops. A kindly providence vouchsafed to him the rare privilege of living to be a centenarian—almost. To him, by natural selection, perhaps, fell the honor of being the town's historian and arbiter of moot questions of names and dates and facts involving the settlers thereabouts. How rare a quality is that which remembers when most of the world forgets!

His rare memory supplied the newspaper man with many a story of old days now and then. The high school student of later days sought him out and chronicled in any essay or school paper some interesting experience of wilderness days. At public gatherings when the pioneers came together, "Uncle Sid" was the moving spirit, the recognized leader in recounting those interesting experiences with which the lives of the pioneers were filled.

Save for a chance newspaper article that has survived, a high school year book, found now and then, with data of the past preserved therein, the memory of the older citizens who enjoyed the rare privilege of listening to "Uncle Sid" VAIL constitutes the only source of information in this day. Oh, that some early-day scribe with note-book and pencil had shadowed "Uncle Sid" and recorded his utterances with the same persistent fidelity with which BOSWELL pursued Dr. JOHNSON.

The third house built in Momence was on the south side of the river and was put up by A. S. VAIL and Judge Orson BEEBE. it was located a few rods west of where the Chicago & Eastern Illinois railroad bridge now is, not far from the South channel of the river. It was a double log cabin of goodly dimensions and, on its completion, the builders engaged in the tavern business. Theirs was the first regularly established tavern in Momence.

Mr. VAIL and Mr. BEEBE bought the land on which the business section of Momence stands today for \$220 in gold. They held possession of this tract for eight years and then lost it by a "float". The peculiar designation of "float" was applied to certain awards of land to members of the Prairie Band of the Pottawattomi under the treaty of 1833, whereby they ceded their lands generally to the United States. Those Indians to whom a land award was made by the government, had the privilege of making their selection wherever they chose after the survey of these lands had been completed, provided, of course, that the land thus chosen had not been previously entered. This privilege was what was termed a "float title". The claim purchased by Mr. VAIL and Mr. BEEBE had been quaranteed to be free from "floats" but it was afterwards ascertained that an Indian "float" had been located on the land. In consequence of this they lost their claims and the only benefit they derived from eight years' occupation of the land was the use of it and the house which stood upon it.

The first frame house built within the present limits of Momence was by Chauncey CHIPMAN, probably about the year 1841 or 1842. As nearly as can be ascertained now it was erected on the east side of Range street, not far from Second, probably on the lot owned by N. CANTWAY, north of the old Knighthart livery stable. In the opinion of Newell BEEBE it was the fourth house to be built within the present limits. It was built before Dr. TODD platted the town of Momence.

L. D. EDWARDS, who came here in 1843, says that the house was standing then and is the same house that now stands on the lot. This, then, is the oldest house in Momence, the prior log structures having long since disappeared.

Messrs. VAIL and BEEBE did a good business with their tavern not-withstanding only a mile away at the "Upper Crossing", the famous Boniface, Robert HILL, held forth at "Hill's Tavern". Prior to 1833 and up until the late sixties these fords were made use of by settlers in Eastern Illinois south of the river and those of south-western Indiana who hauled their produce to Chicago. Year by Year this travel augmented by thousands of immigrants moving into the west. Mr. PARISH says that he has beheld more than a hundred wagon outfits camped on the river at Momence in a single evening. It was a delightful spot in the old days and, apparently, caught the fancy of all who came that way.

About 1845 a good deal of travel from central western Indiana began to be diverted from the "Upper Crossing" to Momence by way of still another ford on the Kankakee that's known as "The Day Ford," situated a mile or two north-east of the village of Aroma Park. Principally these were frontier farmers from Indiana hauling their produce to Chicago who found they were thus enabled to avoid many miles of heavy, sandy road, by cutting across the Chicago-Vincennes Road to this ford where they crossed the Kankakee and followed the trail around to Momence. In the course of the years many hundreds of teams came by this route.

Luther GLEASON tells an interesting story of the days when he was a little boy living on the prairie farm that fronted the river in the segment between Aroma Park and East Court Street bridge, not far from the "Day Ford." Many Indiana farmers used to cross here on their way to Chicago with loads of apples. It was along in 1848 during the Zachary TAYLOR campaign, and the older members of the family used to put him up to hurrah for TAYLOR at such times as the apple wagons Passed by. The result was that TAYLOR being very popular as a presidential candidate among the Indianaians, they would invariably throw out a liberal quantity of apples as they passed in evidence of friendly appreciation. Mr. GLEASON says that one day a lone apple wagon came by and, after he had duly hurrahed for TAYLOR, the driver of the team stopped suddenly and asked: "what for?" And the boy, somewhat abashed and confused at the unexpected query, replied truthfully but haltingly "For Apples."

"Upper Crossing", be it known, was famous in a way long before William LACY and James Van KIRK settled there in 1833. The "Crossing" so far as the white man's activities are concerned, dates back into the gray shadows of the past for more than a century. If Momence citizens were disposed to take advantage of the opportunity thus presented to stress the historical importance of the place as well as that of deserted "Upper Crossing" at the Metcalf farm, they could give us an historical pageant that would be well worth anyone's time to witness.
